

Reflection for Pentecost 15C – Luke 16.1~13



This is one of those strange stories of Jesus. One interpretation is that the steward was cancelling the interest on what was owed to the master, thus obeying the law forbidding interest. Another is that he was cancelling the commission owed to the master by the debtors, so that they would look well on him when he was out of a job. Whatever the title of the story, Jesus praises

shrewdness which is lawful and expects us to use our heads and our hearts in our decisions for him. Martin Luther King said that we need 'hard heads and soft hearts, not soft heads and hard hearts'. The master's commendation may seem strange until we realise that he values the imagination, energy and commitment displayed by the steward. We think of how we bring our imagination to the service of others in the name of the Gospel.



Síxteenth Sunday after Pentecost 25 September 2022

Sentence

Confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective. *James 15.16*

Collect

O God, from whom light rises in darkness for those who seek you: grant us, in all our doubts and uncertainties, the grace to ask what you would have us do, that in your light we may see light, and in your narrow path may not stumble; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Reflection – Luke 16.19~31

This is a parable of startling contrasts, but its central message is simple: be alert to the needs under your nose. It is not concerned with patterns of good living on the part of Lazarus, nor of evil-doing on the part of the rich man. But the latter closed his eyes to the needy at his gate. And without an eye for the needy around us, our life becomes self-centred and callous.

Jesus is asking his listeners to open their eyes to what is around them, and to open their ears to the simple commands of the Gospel: love your neighbour. Life is measured not by wealth, status, or power but in a life of caring and sharing relationships. In a world of extreme consumerism, hedonism and individualism, today's readings have a very important message. Those are truly rich who enrich the lives of others. www.sacredspace.ie

Sentence

Who is greater, the one who is at the table or the one who serves? But I am among you,' says the Lord, 'as one who serves.' *Luke 22.27*

Collect

Faithful God, have mercy on us your unworthy servants, and increase our faith, that, trusting in your Spirit's power to work in us and through us, we may never be ashamed to witness to our Lord but may obediently serve him all our days; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holv Spirit. one God. now and for ever. Amen.

Reflection - Luke 17.5~10

Today we dwell in wonder on the words of Jesus: if your faith is the size of a small seed, it is enough. Jesus draws attention to the greatness hidden in something tiny. We too are tiny, but God empowers those who truly follow him to do great things. God can work through us, beyond all our hopes and dreams, when we do not get in the way.

Jesus also taught us that 'the leader becomes as one who serves', and that 'if anyone would be first, he must be servant of all'. Thus, Jesus overturns the values of worldliness. It is no coincidence that when we serve the Lord freely, we feel an ever more profound peace. It is like hearing once again the Lord say: 'Come, come, good and faithful servant!'' www.sacredspace.ie

Eighteenth Sunday after Pentecost 9 October 2022

Sentence

What shall I return to the Lord for all his bounty to me? I will lift up the cup of salvation and call on the name of the Lord, I will pay my vows to the Lord in the presence of all his people.

Collect

O God, you have made heaven and earth and all that is good: help us to delight in simple things and to rejoice always in the richness of your bounty; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Reflection – Luke 17.11~19

Jesus was travelling on the borders of Galilee. Just as he entered a village he was met by ten lepers. Calling Jesus from a safe distance, they cried out: "Jesus, Master, have compassion on us!" Jesus simply told them to go and show themselves to the priests. And, while they were on their way, they were all cured. The point of this story however is not in the healing but in the gratitude of the one who returned, the Samaritan, the stranger, the doubly-outcast. Despite experiencing a wonderful healing event in their lives, nine of the ten lepers did not discover a new relationship to God. But the Samaritan leper did. Jesus tells him "your faith has made you well". He has experienced a double healing.

We live in times of entitlement, when the list of what we claim to be ours by right seems to grow longer by the day. That leaves little space for being grateful. But how can one be happy without being grateful? We ask for the grace of an open and grateful heart.

The Feast of St Francis of Assisi — 4th of October

On this day commemorations are held to remember St Francis of Assisi, a 12th Century born patron Saint of animals and the environment.

Francis was born in Assisi, Italy, in 1181 and was the son of a wealthy silk merchant. Living a popular and rich lifestyle, Francis decided to enlist in the army as a young man. His glory days, however, were short-lived as Francis was captured and held prisoner for a year. Once released, he returned to his indulgent life.

An illness made Francis question his life and as such he decided to embark on a pilgrimage to Rome. Here, he witnessed a great deal of poverty and returned home a changed man. His lifestyle choices included dressing more modestly, and donating silk to the poor. From here onwards, Francis decided to live a life following God. He lived as a beggar in Assisi and repaired ruined churches. He later travelled across Europe and the Middle East while trying to spread the word of God.

Known for his love of animals, Francis called animals fellow 'brothers' and 'sisters'. He loved every living thing created by God

> Lord, make me an instrument of your peace: where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy.

O divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen
